An expanded partnership gives Lions Club members a new perspective on their eyeglass donation project.

In January 2011, Lions Club members toured the new College of Optometry building, it was then they were offered a chance to help sort glasses they collect and donate to the college.

“Shortly after the new College of Optometry building was built at Ferris State University, we got a tour of the new facility,” said Lions Club member Tony Rutledge. “It was during this tour, we were asked if our members would like to participate in the next step from collecting eyeglasses.”

The partnership between the Big Rapids Lions Club and the College of Optometry at FSU helps the Volunteer Optometric Service to Humanity clinics around the world. VOSH is a worldwide organization with a mission to provide vision care to individuals who cannot afford or obtain the services.

The 50 chapters around the world work with local service organizations — like Rotary International, Lions Club International and churches — to provide free eye exams and dispense glasses to those in need.

Dan Wrubel is a professor at the Michigan College of Optometry at Ferris State University, and has a private practice in Eaton Rapids. He also is the faculty adviser to the student VOSH chapter at MCO.

“We probably sort over 250,000 glasses per year at MCO,” Wrubel said. “Without the Lions Club recycled glasses project, VOSH Mission would not be what they are today. They also donate money each year to assist

the student interns going on their respective mission trips.”

The opportunity for Lions Club members to sort glasses and work closer with SVOSH students brings in a whole new perspective.

“These are life-altering experiences,” Rutledge said. “Giving a person the chance to see for their first time is an emotional experience for those involved. Seeing smiles and joy from those you’ve helped is something not all us Lions Club members get to do.”

Lions Club members have helped sort glasses now for little more than a year.

“We come in on the third Monday of each month,” Rutledge said. We spend around two hours sorting glasses with the SVOSH students.”

The partnership between FSU and the Lions Club has helped VOSH continue its mission.

“We have an excellent rapport with the area Lions Clubs,” Wrubel said. “They not only collect and transport recycled glasses to us, they also donate money, help sort the glasses and contribute other support throughout the year.”

Lion’s Club member Rick Horst has only helped a few times in the sorting process but likes the chance to see what happens to all the glasses they collect.

“We are taught to grade and sort glasses on prescription, male, female and children. It is so much fun to help out,” Horst said.

When Horst first started sorting he did not believe the amount of glasses volunteers went through each month.

“We sort huge volumes of glasses,” Horst said. “It is amazing the work Wrubel and his students do with all those glasses.”

BIG RAPIDS — Many people possess a gift of compassion and are ready to help orphans, disabled, lonely elderly people, and even stray animals, but for Lions Club members serving is about dedication.

James (Jim) Chipman is a Big Rapids Lions Club member who does not serve alone. He shares his duties with others by carrying the load together. “The Lions motto is ‘We Serve,’” Chipman said. “I have tried to live up to that motto and be an example, but it is not done without the help of the people around me.” The Lions Club in Big Rapids just celebrated its 75th year in March, and Chipman was honored in May with the S.A. Dodge award. The S.A. Dodge Award recognizes Lions who have made an outstanding contribution toward promoting Michigan Lions at the International level. It is the highest award given by Multiple District 11 (Michigan’s Lower Peninsula). Only two awards are given each year, and it is named after S.A. Dodge, who was Michigan’s third president of the Lions Club International from 1953 to 1954.

“Jim has excelled at the club level and the district level,” said Lions Club member Bill Simpson. “He served as club president, club secretary, district governor, district zone chairmen and he recruited at least four new members into the Lions club.” Simpson is the recent past district governor for the district that the Big Rapids Lions Club is part of. He said that people might not know that there is a club level and a district level for Lions members. Michigan’s Lower Peninsula has 10 Lions districts and each district has a governor, said Simpson. “Jim’s dedication to the club at the local and district levels is the reason why he was recognized,” Simpson said. “Jim also was inducted into the very prestigious Lions of Michigan Hall of Fame. When you have reached that level in Michigan you have done very well as a Lion.”

Chipman has been a Big Rapids Lions Club member for more than 40 years. He has held numerous leadership positions in the Lions Club and throughout Michigan. The Big Rapids club was in its 35th year when Chipman joined. Chipman owned J and C Electric in town, which was part of the community for 17 years. “This is a great town to work in, and we have great people in it,” said Chipman, who has lived with his wife, Carolyn, in the Big Rapids area for 51 years. “We love this community and it has always been good to Carolyn and I over the years.” Carolyn said Jim and the other members of the club are dedicated to the community in which they live. “I’m not a Lion myself,” Carolyn said. “But I see that they have fun, and I know what Jim has done for the club and the people around him. They all care for each other and care for this community.” The Lions Club is able to help people because of the donations that come from individuals in the community. “None of the money we receive from the public goes to us,” Chipman said. “It all goes to help those who are need in our neighborhoods.”

Jim is honored about his recent recognition, but remains humble, and says he did not accomplish this alone. "It was because of my friends, my club, family and my district," Chipman said. "It's not just what one individual does; you are part of a bigger thing as a Lion." He said it was the sacrifice, hard work and dedication to the community, club and its members as one of the reasons for recognition. "Everybody supports you and each other in the club to get where we are at," Chipman said. "I don't want anybody to think I stood out there and got these awards by myself, because it doesn't happen that way."

Current Lions Club president Jackie Perrin said Chipman deserves the recognition. "He is good-hearted man and he is very dedicated to whatever he gets involved with," Perrin said. "Jim puts all of himself into what he does; he is extremely enthusiastic and keeps all of the volunteers on task."

Chipman is one of the founding members of the Lions of Michigan Foundation, and he said the idea to create a foundation came up because there was a need to serve more people. "I was very fortunate to be serving on the board during the founding some 27 or 28 years ago," Jim said. "We are able to help a lot more people in the state of Michigan because of the foundation." The Lions of Michigan Foundation helps with cataract surgeries, hearing aids and much more for the people who can't afford such things on their own.

The Lions Club in Big Rapids has changed over the years. Gone are the light bulb sales, spaghetti dinners and chicken diner fundraisers. Today it is the partnership with Ferris State University's athletics that serves the club well. Jim has worked the concession stand at Bulldog football games for 15 years. "It is always fun to work with Jim," Simpson said. "For 10 years, I've been working with him in the concession stand during the football games and it is always fun and entertaining."

Chipman has a personal feeling of accomplishment and gratification when he is helping other people. "I was honored when I was asked to join Lions," Chipman said. "I have stayed a Lion because I know we are making our communities a better place." Carolyn said the fun they have during those games with each other is all part of the Lion way. "If you can't have fun doing this, then there is no sense doing it," Chipman said. "It is tough to be a volunteer, it takes a lot of money out of your pocket and it takes a hell of a lot of time, but in the end it's all worth it." The rewards of volunteering are numerous and priceless, Carolyn added. "It is worth it, hearing the stories from the people who are so grateful for the Lions is so rewarding," she said. "Seeing Jim help those children, or hearing him on the phone say, 'We can help you,' brings joy to your heart, and that is something money can't buy."

Chipman volunteered in Mississippi with Presbyterian Disaster Assistance after Hurricane Katrina hit the gulf coast. "I think Jim is the very description of a volunteer," Simpson said. "Where you take out your own self-interest to serve and put the interest of the community first, that is Jim, a true volunteer."

Carolyn is Jim's strongest supporter through all of his endeavors. She said when Jim came home after his first trip to the gulf the stories he shared were so emotional. "I remember when Jim returned the first time, the stories he shared about the people and their survival during the storm were heart-felt," Carolyn said. "Our local church members began donating Lowe's cards so they could buy the building materials."

In the end it all comes down to your own self-sacrifice and what you can and will do for the community you live in, Chipman said. "Have fun doing what you do for others and the reward you get is seeing smiles from those you help," Chipman said.

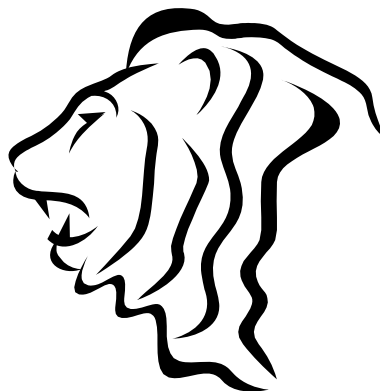

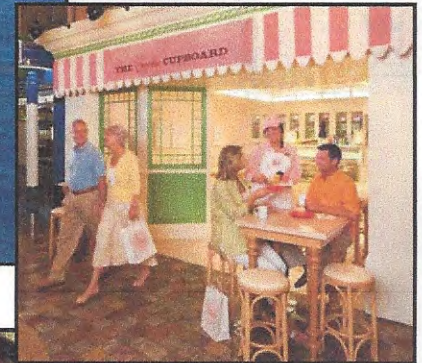
