### Important Location Change for the 2025 International Convention

The 2025 international convention has been moved to Orlando, Florida over the dates of July 13 -17.

#### Why the Change in Location?

The contracts for Mexico City were not in place and when LCI went to Mexico to fix this situation they raised the prices by millions of dollars. So, LCI said is there any other place in the world that can host us on such short notice. Orlando said we can. You will be sent more information as soon as it becomes available.

## **Hurricane Response- Lions on the Ground**

The other important thing you should know about is the devastation in North Carolina and Florida. The Lions were there helping in the first 24 hours after the storms made landfall last month. We had 12 district Lions apply for grants and LCI issued each of them \$10,000 right away. They also granted the state lions of North Carolina and Florida \$100,000 each to help in each of their states. This is where part of your dues goes. WE SERVE, it is great to be a lion. The Global Action teams will have a zoom dealing with membership on the 19 of October. This will be coming from the state office.

## **Spring 2025 District Conference- April 25-26, Clare, MI**

To reduce the cost of the spring conference so more Lions can attend we are looking at ways to reduce the price. Costs for hotel facilities, meats, rooms, etc. keep going up at an alarming rate. Karen Joy, a new 2VD Governor in the Kalamazoo Area, works for Pfizer and has told us her company has a matching grant program. It matches \$2.00 for every \$1.00 a group puts up to a limit of \$7,500. If each district donates \$500 it would amount to \$5,500 which would help offset some of the costs for the spring convention. I will continue to work on this with the hope of making it more affordable for Lions.

Hi Fellow Lions! I am excited to report that a fun time was had by all at this year's second annual Lions Bear Lake Camp open house September 13 and 14<sup>th</sup>. We had 6 members attending from our district this year. which was a 600% increase compared to last year. The day started with a leisure no stress drive to Bear Lake Camp in Lapeer through some beautiful countryside and small towns. Upon arrival all were greeted by Tracy Tribley, Executive Camp Director, and Chrissy Andre, our State Chairperson.

We were then assigned our "free" dormitory style, spacious cabins (10 in total each housing up to 16 people) with all the modern amenities, less TV :), including indoor bathroom and showers, overlooking a beautiful tranquil lake. After a "free" fabulous buffet dinner provided by Bear Lake Camp (They also provided a "free" fabulous breakfast and lunch on Saturday and no worries about any special dietary needs as they've got that covered after working with a Camp record of almost 1100 kids this summer). Did you pick up on how affordable this weekend getaway was; all while learning what Bear Camp has to offer, not only for kids' summer camp but activities throughout the year for adult groups too? More to come on that in future District Newsletter Camp updates. This explains why they are booked throughout the year except for Thanksgiving and Christmas. We then concluded the evening with a bonfire, s'mores, conversation, laughter and comradery.

The next morning's activity choices at Bear Lake Camp included conquering a 50-foot rock climbing tower and zip lining experience, complete of course with instructions, safety harness and supporting safety overhead rope lines, all pre-tested by several Certified Camp course instructors before allowing us to face our inner fears but then feeling exhilarated at having completed something that secretly was on your bucket list. Just ask PDG Jim Patterson about his Tower Wall rock climbing and Zip Line experience. I'll bet he'll try to talk you in to it! I can't wait until next year to do it again.... Sign me up!!!!

They can even accommodate adults and kids with mobility issues on the tower climb and zip line as proven by one of the attending Lions Sue Adams, with their accessible facilities. She was able to climb the tower and zip line and be lowered back into her mobility device. To paraphrase Chrissy Andre Camp State Director, "This moment captured the spirit of inclusion that Bear Lake Camp stands for". Other more leisure activity choices included fishing off a dock in front of cabins, archery, camp tours, nature center tour, boating and I believe I saw a sign up for an indoor activity.

Another of the favorite activities was to try a few of the 16 Team Building (Problem Solving) Challenge events placed throughout the woods such as tight rope walking. Walking a low to the ground approximately 20 foot stretched cable by holding on to overhead ropes spaced about 5 or 6 feet apart, then having the next person doing

it backwards and for the final event having me walk it backwards, blind folded, with one rope removed without telling me. All the while being guided and supported by your fellow team members to complete and keep you from falling. Another was the group balance platform (Aptly called “the boat”) where the platform could tilt 360 degrees from a central pivot point. The object of the challenge was to work together as a group to try to try to balance the platform level with everyone standing on it. You soon learned moving one person’s foot a few inches can change the center of gravity. Lot harder than it sounds but certainly fun had by all!

The Challenge Course Coordinator/Director Kenny Gillotte is a former student Camper himself who went on to college and received his master’s degree and who came back to give back to the Camp. Kenny also teaches and explains to the group and the individuals in a very dynamic way how all these challenges that need to be overcome and what are perceived to be mental obstacles in each of the 16 challenges can help you navigate through real life.

So, if you’re looking for something affordable to excite your senses and challenge your inner self or just enjoy kicking back and relaxing on your cabin deck absorbing all nature has to offer or even just hanging out at the main hall with Lion friends; then Lions Bear Lake Camp Open House for all Lions throughout the State is the place to be next year. Next year’s Open House date has not yet been determined. Of special note this may be an especially great additional recruitment enticement tool for younger members showing an interest in joining your club.

While the above is all fun and games, the serious issue side is how Bear Lake Camp needs to continue to fund the growing attendance and upkeep operations year after year. They rely heavily on the generous support of Lion clubs throughout Michigan. Lions Bear Lake Camp still needs ongoing donations to maintain and improve their facilities, programs and accessibility. Our District Clubs and individual contributions are essential to helping them meet the needs of their growing number of campers and guests. This attendance increase is a testimonial to what Camp Director Traci Tribley and her Staff are accomplishing.

A big “Thanks” to the many District Clubs who have already stepped up this year and we encourage all clubs to continue their support. An **ESPECIALLY BIG THANK YOU** to the attending clubs at the District 11E1 Fall Conference Sept. 28<sup>th</sup> in Harrison who contributed collectively \$3300 at the Parade of Checks for the Camp. This was a \$700 increase per my records for that day compared to last year. Also, an **ADDITIONAL THANK YOU** to those clubs that are also donating to Lions Bear Lake Camp but have not yet mailed their checks in to Peggy, our District Treasurer.

In conclusion Lions Bear Lake Camp is a State Project and we need all Michigan Lions and Lion Clubs to support this awesome camp. There is not any camp like this in the state with all the programs it provides for the kids in Michigan. So, when your Club does its Budget for next year 2025, please put some money or additional money aside for this **SPECIAL CAMP**.
